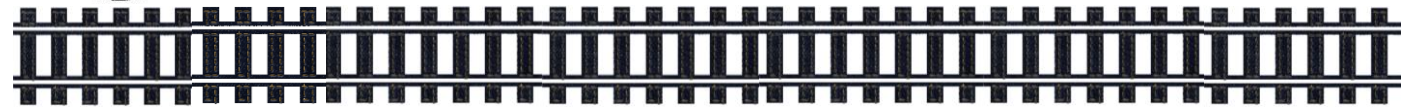

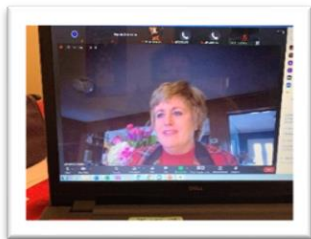

FUN FACTS ABOUT IRVING!

- The city of Irving was founded on December 19, 1903 by way of a town lot auction.
- The city of Irving began on 80 acres, today it encompasses 67.7 square miles.
- Natural gas service arrived in Irving in 1911.
- Electric service came to Irving in 1925.
- The University of Dallas, a Catholic liberal arts college, opened in Irving in 1956. Irving's first institute of higher learning.
- Irving's first hospital, Irving Community Hospital, opened in 1964. Today it is part of the Baylor, Scott and White hospital system.
- Texas Stadium, home to the Dallas Cowboys football team, opened in Irving in 1971 bringing Irving its first national recognition. The stadium closed in 2008.

The players used their own imagination to select the cover-up pieces which included buttons, coins, candy pieces and scraps of paper. Prizes of restaurant gift cards were mailed to the lucky winners. Attendees were asked to share the oldest item in their home (not including their spouse!). Jenn Landry, Director of the Irving Archives and Museum brought us up to date on the new museum.

Christmas Tree at Irving Arts Center - Gary Schepf chaired the decorating of our Christmas tree at the Arts Center competition, assisted by Judy Samuel, Charlotte Callahan, Lilly Allison, Jearlene Miller, and Mary Higbie. With a theme of 1903 and the notable Babes in Toyland operetta, photos of various community "note-ables" were displayed along with their favorite holiday song.

What's Shaking at Heritage Park - The general meeting was held virtually on January 8th. Since this is the birth date of Elvis Presley, the program was titled "What's 'Shaking' at Heritage Park?". Parks and Recreation Department Director Joe Moses and Amy Kinkade brought us up to date on the renovation going on at Heritage Park. The project is expected to be completed by the end of the year, in time for the holiday events.

HERITAGE PARK RENOVATION PROJECT

This project will completely redevelop the existing Heritage Park. In addition to relocating and renovating the existing Depot, Library, Water Tower and Caboose rail car, this project will also provide for a new entertainment stage building and gazebo.

The entertainment stage facility will include a permanent sound system with stage lighting and a large video screen for movie showings and performance visual graphics.

With construction starting in June of 2020, construction is near 50% complete. Underground utilities and building foundations have been completed. The Depot, Library and Caboose have been moved to their permanent location with building renovations underway.

The masonry for the stage building has started and roof steel beams installed. Sidewalks at the street intersections and the site interior are being installed. The project is scheduled to be completed this Fall.



KING'S SQUARE King's Square, located at 200 Gilbert, is a pocket park and will act as a gateway to the southern section of the Bear Creek Heritage Community. The Bear Creek Community in west Irving is one of the oldest African American communities in Dallas County. The project will honor the legacy of Martin Luther King.

Planning & Community Development has allocated approximately \$310,000 of CDBG funds for development.

The project will have architectural pavement, brick columns and walls, seating, shade trees, landscaping, and irrigation. Construction is underway and is scheduled to be complete by the end of May.
